Facts for Families

Haiti Child Sponsorship Program

Since 1997 Westminster members have lovingly supported La Croix students. A \$240 annual sponsorship gift provides a Haitian student with a quality education, a uniform and a daily meal.

The school staff stretches sponsorship donations for 1500 students to cover the cost of educating 3500 students.

The Clinic at La Croix

In 1998, George King, along with several members of the Thomas Presbyterian and Newlonsburg Presbyterian Churches, participated in the construction of the Clinic at La Croix. As of 2009, a maternity clinic and residence for doctors and nurses has been built. Additional exam and waiting rooms have recently been added to the clinic. Two full-time doctors, nurses, a dentist, and a pharmacist staff the clinic. The clinic is completely self-sustaining.

La Femmes De La Croix Scarf Project

This project was started in 2007 and has taught young women — both mission staff and high school students — how to paint silk scarves. The girls earn money for each scarf they produce. Scarves are currently sold in the U.S. and all the proceeds are given to the mission to buy uniform fabric for the La Croix students.
